

Oakley and The Candovers Ward Profile



Population

The 2011 Census population of Oakley and The Candovers was 8,045. The population had decreased by 55 people since 2001, approximately 0.7%. Compared to an increase of 10.0% for Basingstoke and Deane.

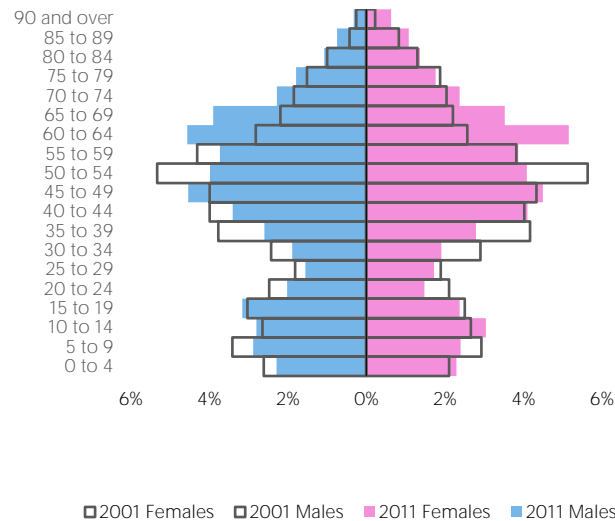

Length of Residence

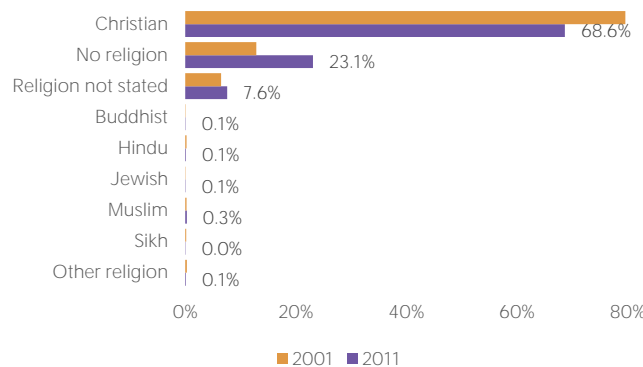
6.5% of the population were born outside the UK. 69.7% of these people had lived in the UK for 10 years or more.

Age and Gender Profile



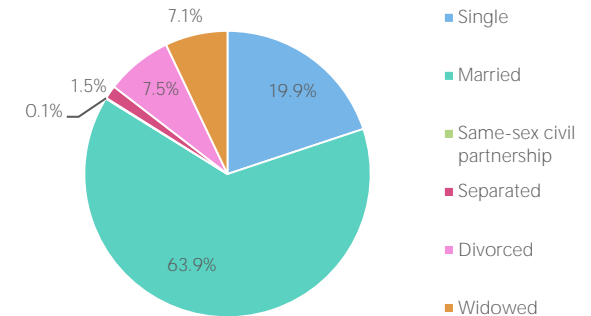
The population had aged since 2001. The percentage of the population aged 45 and over increased by 13.6%, whilst the population aged under 45 declined by 12.9%.

Religion



The majority of residents were Christian (68.6%) but this figure had declined by 13.8% since 2001. Over a fifth (23.1%) had no religion, which was an increase of 79.5% since 2001.

Marital and Civil Partnership Status



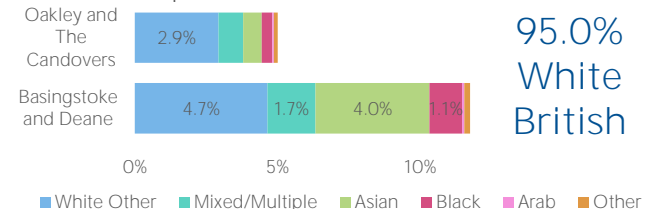
The percentage of the adult population that were married declined by 2.6% over the decade. Compared to a 5.2% decline for Basingstoke and Deane. The percentage that were divorced increased by 29.8%.

Ethnic Group

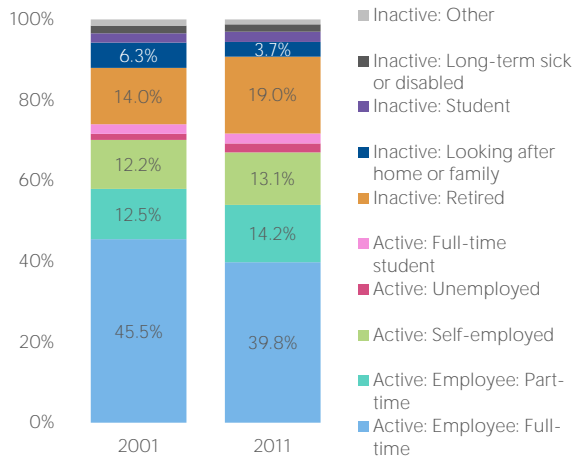

Non-White British ethnicities made up 5.0% of the ward's population (shown on the chart).

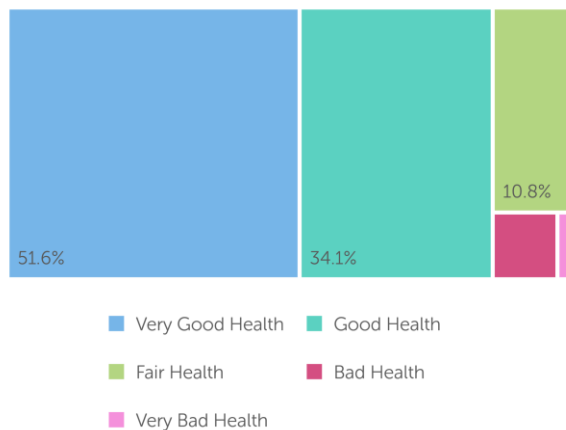


Economic Activity



Almost two fifths (39.8%) of all residents aged 16-74 were working full-time in 2011, a decline of 12.5% since 2001. Those that were retired accounted for 19.0%, an increase of 36.2% since 2001. The percentage that were self-employed increased by 7.1%.

General Health



51.6% of the population were in very good health and a further 34.1% were in good health. Of those with bad or very bad health (3.5%), 49.5% were aged 65 and over.

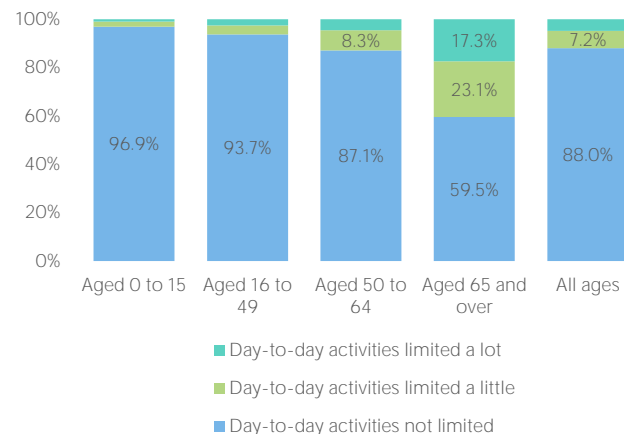
Occupation

Top five occupations:

1. Corporate managers and directors (9.7%)
2. Business and public service associate professionals (8.9%)
3. Administrative occupations (8.7%)
4. Science research, engineering and technology professionals (8.0%)
5. Business, media and public service professionals (6.4%)

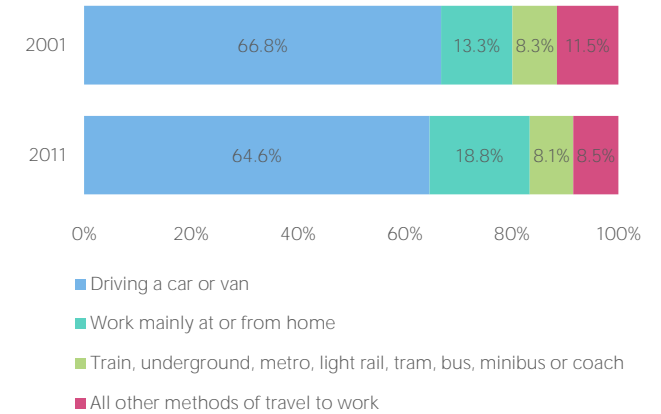
These top five occupations accounted for 41.8% of all the occupations in the ward. Since 2001, the percentage of the population employed in professional occupations (shown in blue) increased by 49.5%, whilst the percentage employed as managers, directors and senior officials (shown in purple) declined by 31.3%.

Long-Term Health Problem or Disability



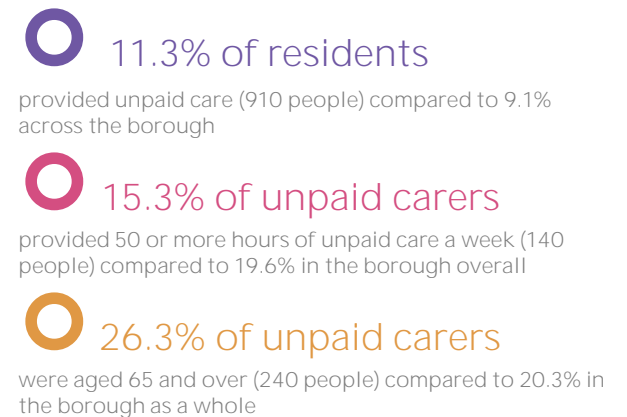
The percentage with a health problem or disability increased with age. 40.5% of those aged 65 and over had their day to day activities limited, compared to 45.3% across the borough.

Method of Travel to Work



The majority (64.6%) of those aged 16-74 in employment drove a car to work. The percentage travelling by car declined by 3.3% since 2001. The percentage travelling by public transport decreased (-2.2%), whilst home working increased (+40.8%).

Provision of Unpaid Care



Qualifications

15.2% of those age 16 and over had no qualifications.



Dwellings

The number of dwellings in Oakley and The Candovers in 2011 was 3,410. This was an increase of 90 dwellings since 2001, approximately 2.6%. Compared to 13.0% for Basingstoke and Deane and 8.9% for the South East.



In addition to dwellings, there were six communal establishments in the ward containing 50 people. These were care homes, hotels and youth hostels.

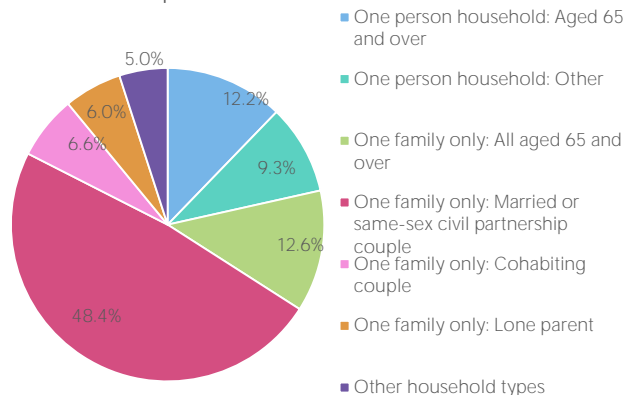

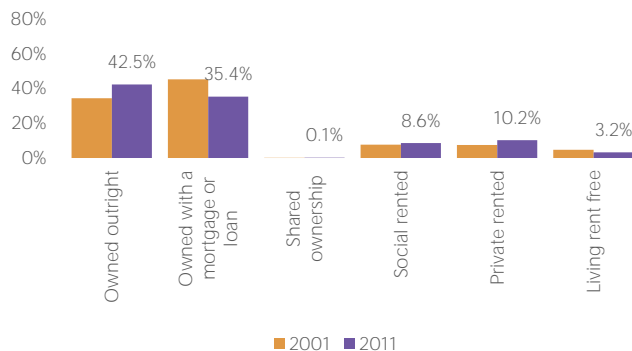
Over the decade, average household size declined from 2.48 to 2.41. Average household size was similar to the borough (2.40) and region (2.38) average. The average home in Oakley and The Candovers had 6.5 rooms and 3.3 bedrooms, above the borough average (5.8 and 2.9).

Household Composition



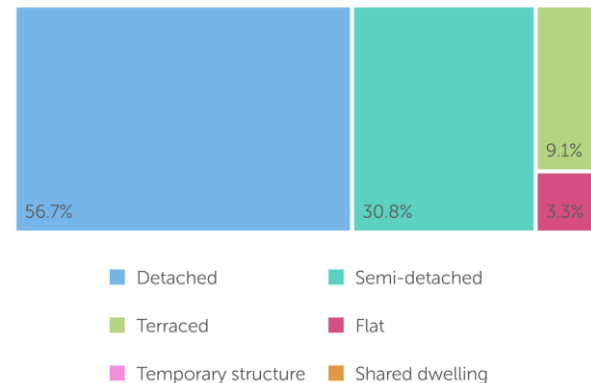
There were 3,310 households in Oakley and The Candovers and the 7,995 people. Many households were occupied by married or same-sex civil partnership couple households (48.4%). Over a fifth (21.5%) of households were lived in by those that live alone, an increase of 4.9% since 2001. A quarter (25.1%) of households were occupied entirely by those aged 65 and over.

Household Tenure



Over the decade, the percentage of households that owned their home with a mortgage declined by 21.5%. Outright ownership increased by 23.2%, whilst private renting grew by 35.0%. Social renting increased by 11.2%.

Accommodation Type



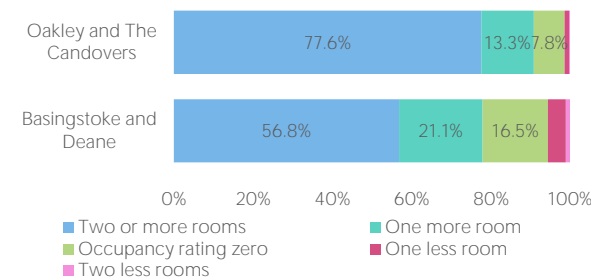
The majority of households lived in detached properties (56.7%). The percentage living in flats declined by 10.8% over the decade. The percentage living in houses and bungalows increased by 0.5%.

Car Availability

8.4% of households had no access to a car or van, compared to 15.2% for Basingstoke and Deane as a whole. 5.6% had access to four or more cars or vans. There were 5,875 cars or vans.



Occupancy Rating

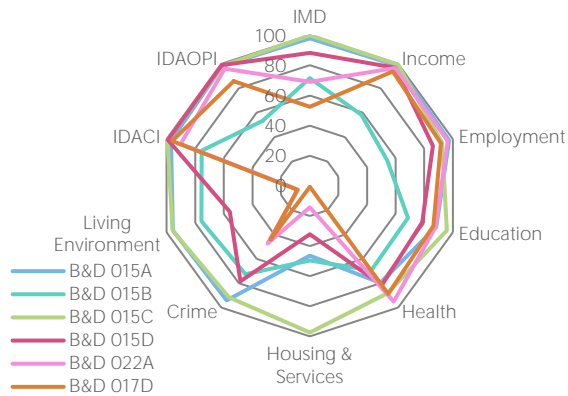


The majority of households had two or more rooms than they needed (77.6%).

Indices of Deprivation, 2019



The chart shows Indices of Deprivation data for each domain and both IDACI and IDAOPI. It records how deprived each Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) in the ward was compared with all LSOAs in England. The closer each LSOA is to 32,844 (shown as 100), the lower the deprivation. B&D 017D was more disadvantaged than the other LSOAs in the ward (LSOA boundaries are shown on the ward map).

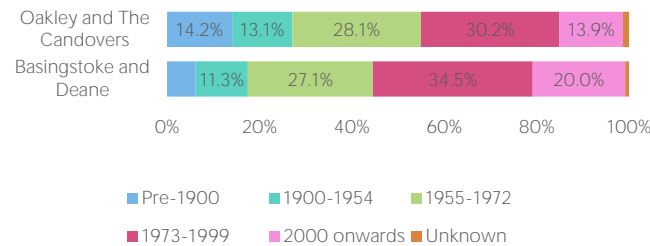

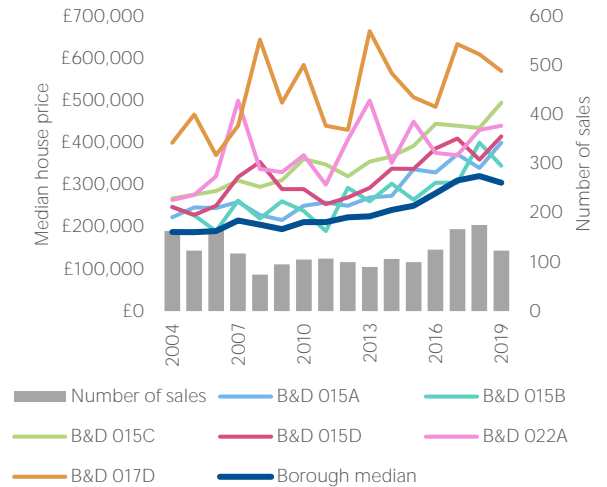


Council tax property build period, 2020



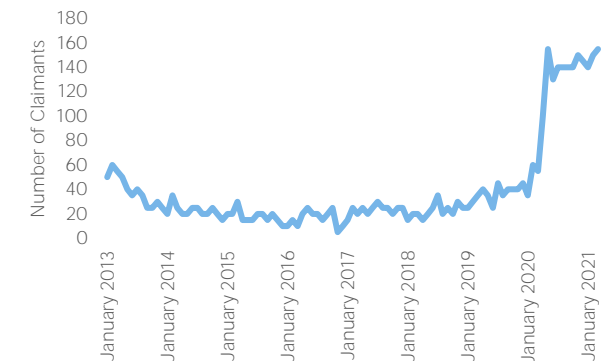
Oakley and The Candovers had a larger percentage of dwellings built before 1900 compared to Basingstoke and Deane as a whole, with 14.2% built pre-1900, compared to 6.2% for the borough overall.

House prices and sales, 2004-2019



There were 125 home sales in 2019, similar to the number previous years. This was 4.1% of the borough's house sales. One LSOA within the ward (B&D 017D) had a median house price in 2019 of £570,000, compared to the borough median of £305,000, and prices in this LSOA are consistently well above the borough average.

Unemployed Benefit Claimant Count, 2013 to 2021



The number of unemployed benefit claimants peaked in May 2020 and March 2021.

Ward Map

The ward boundary is shown in grey.

Due to ward boundary changes, some data is only available for output areas (OAs) and lower super output areas (LSOAs) that best fit the ward area. An OA and LSOA is allocated to a ward if its population weighted centroid falls within the ward.

The OA boundaries and ward boundary are aligned for this ward, but the LSOA boundaries are not aligned with the ward boundary. This means that Steventon (shown with green diagonal lines) is not included in the LSOA data for this ward. Two LSOAs (shown in pink and orange) also include part of Winklebury and Manydown ward and Basing and Upton Grey ward.

Oakley and The Candovers contains six LSOAs and these are shown with coloured backgrounds on the map.

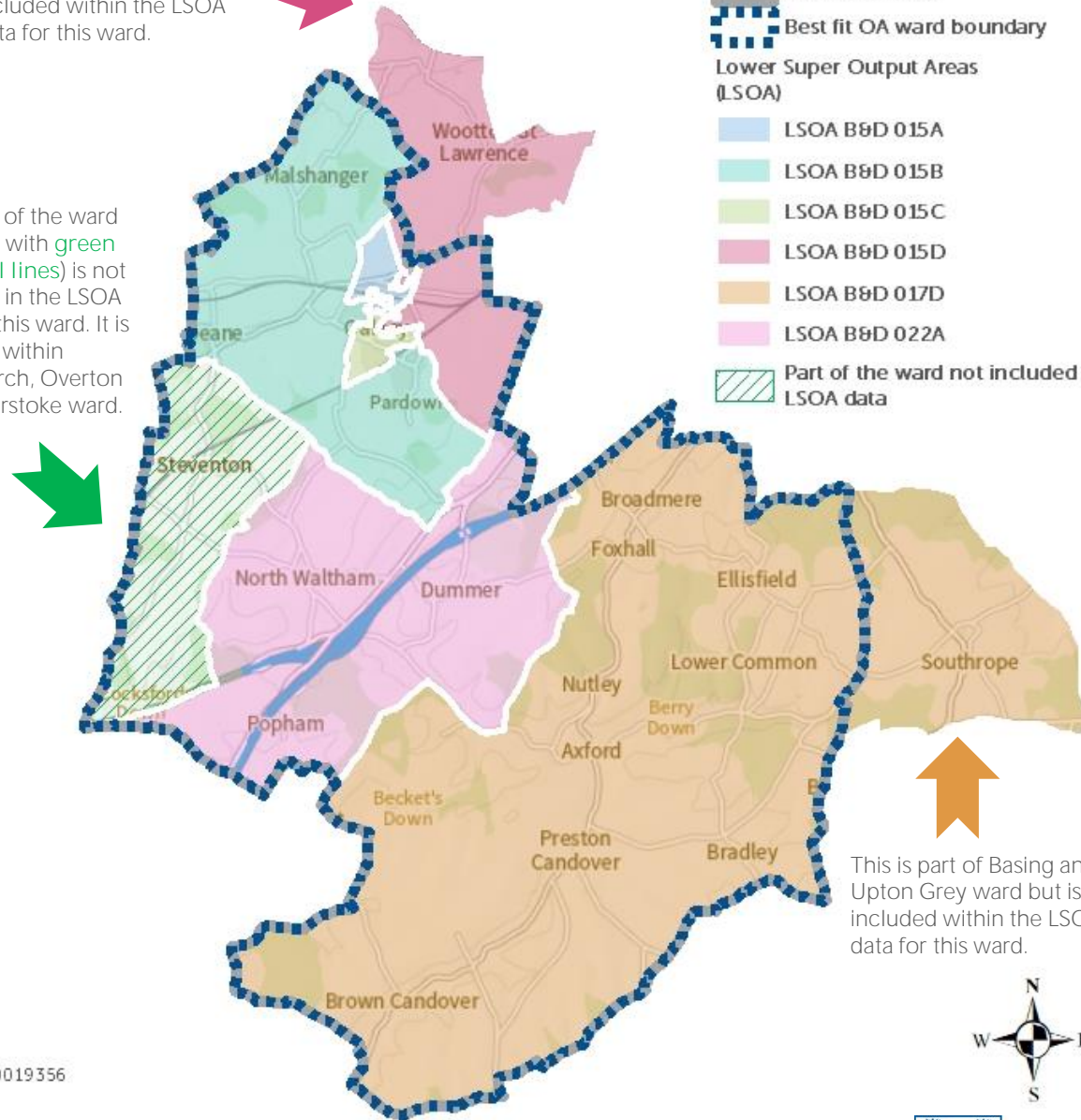
This is part of Winklebury and Manydown ward but is included within the LSOA data for this ward.
