

Popley Ward Profile



Population

The 2011 Census population of Popley was 10,025. The population had increased by 2,250 people since 2001, approximately 14.2%. Compared to 10.0% for Basingstoke and Deane and 7.9% for the South East.

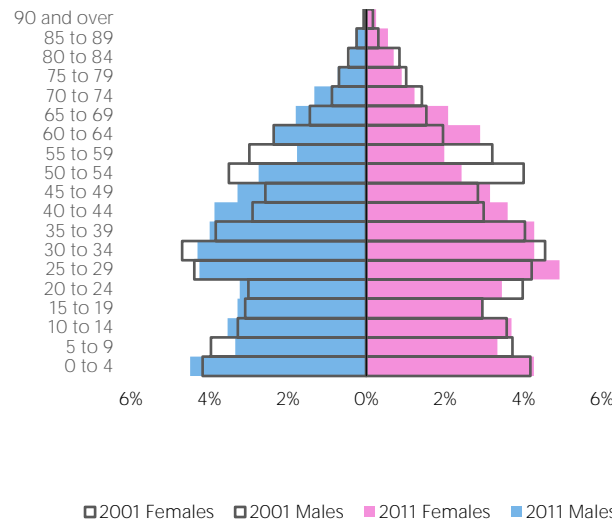


In addition to the usually resident population, there were 60 schoolchildren and students that lived outside the ward during term-time.

Length of Residence

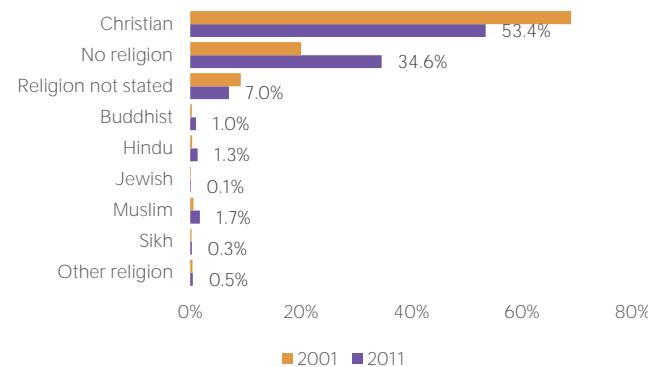
16.3% of the population were born outside the UK. 34.0% of these people had lived in the UK for less than five years.

Age and Gender Profile



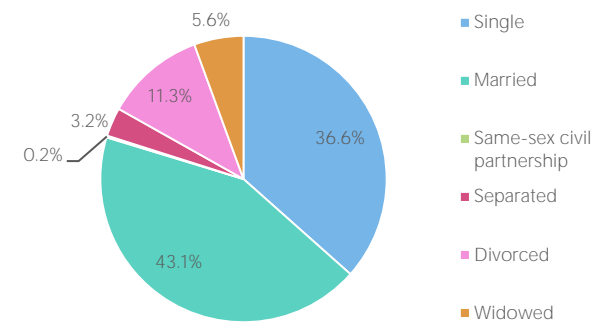
The population had got slightly younger since 2001. The percentage of the population aged 45 and over decreased by 3.0%, whilst the population aged under 45 increased by 1.4%.

Religion



The majority of residents were Christian (53.4%) but this figure had declined by 22.4% since 2001. Over a third (34.6%) had no religion, which was an increase of 73.0% since 2001.

Marital and Civil Partnership Status



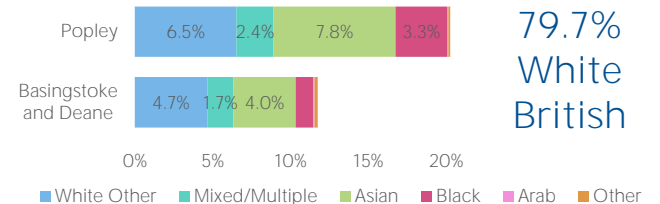
The percentage of the adult population that were married declined by 8.2% over the decade. Compared to a 5.2% decline for Basingstoke and Deane. The percentage that were single increased by 13.6%.

Polish and Nepalese were the other most common main languages

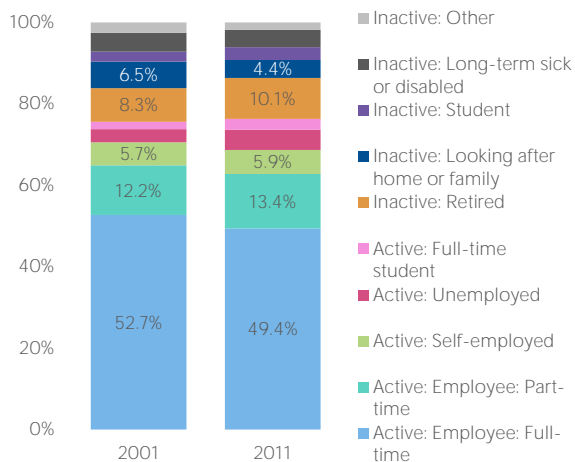
Ethnic Group



79.7% White British. Non-White British ethnicities made up 20.3% of the ward's population (shown on the chart).

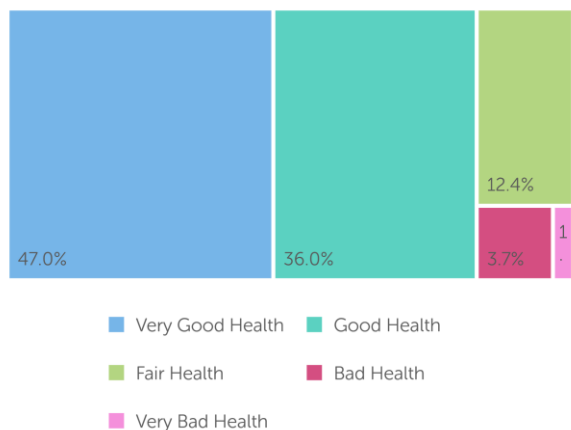


Economic Activity



Almost half (49.4%) of all residents aged 16-74 were working full-time in 2011, a decline of 6.2% since 2001. Those that were retired accounted for 10.1%, an increase of 21.1% since 2001. The percentage that were self-employed increased by 3.7%.

General Health



47.0% of the population were in very good health and a further 36.0% were in good health. Of those with bad or very bad health (4.7%), 32.5% were aged 65 and over.

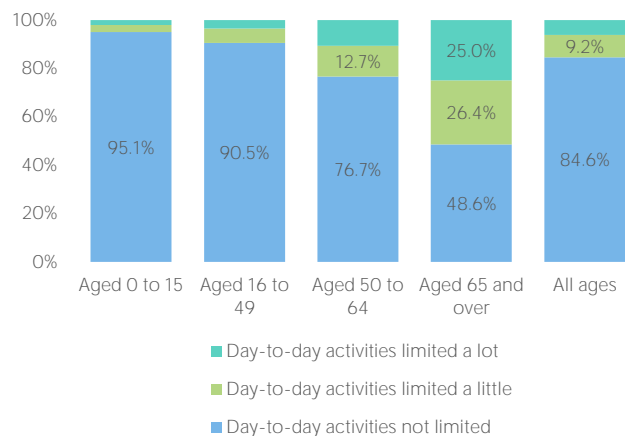
Occupation

Top five occupations:

1. Elementary administration and service occupations (15.5%)
2. Administrative occupations (9.3%)
3. Sales occupations (7.7%)
4. Caring personal service occupations (7.6%)
5. Science research, engineering and technology professionals (6.5%)

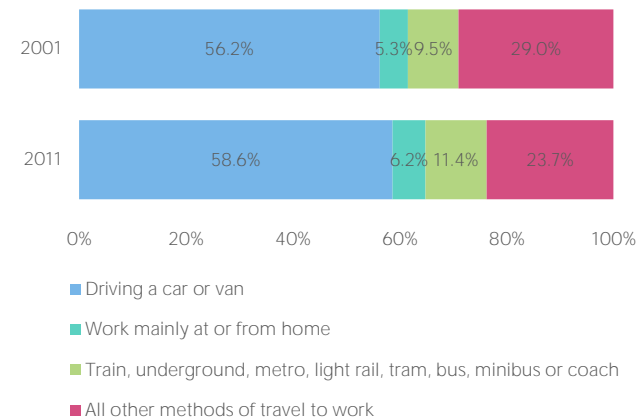
These top five occupations accounted for 46.9% of all the occupations in the ward. Since 2001, the percentage of the population employed in professional occupations (shown in blue) increased by 120.6%, whilst the percentage employed in caring, leisure and other service occupations (shown in green) increased by 37.4%.

Long-Term Health Problem or Disability



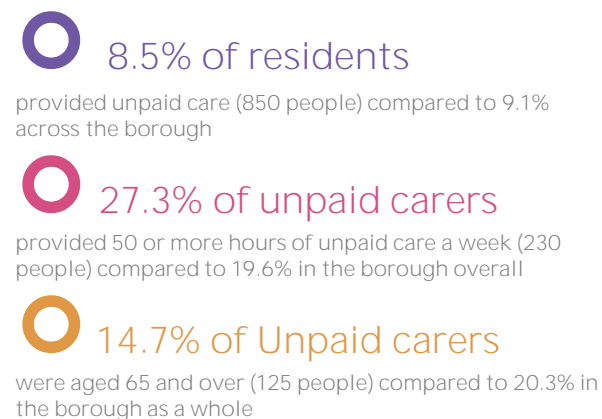
The percentage with a health problem or disability increased with age. 51.4% of those aged 65 and over had their day to day activities limited, compared to 45.3% across the borough.

Method of Travel to Work



The majority (58.6%) of those aged 16-74 in employment drove a car to work. The percentage travelling by car increased by 4.2% since 2001. The percentage travelling by public transport increased (+20.6%), along with home working (+17.6%).

Provision of Unpaid Care



Qualifications

23.6% of those age 16 and over had no qualifications.

Dwellings

The number of dwellings in Popley in 2011 was 4,080. This was an increase of 635 dwellings since 2001, approximately 18.4%. Compared to 13.0% for Basingstoke and Deane and 8.9% for the South East.



In addition to dwellings, there was one communal establishment in the ward containing 15 people. This was a hotel.

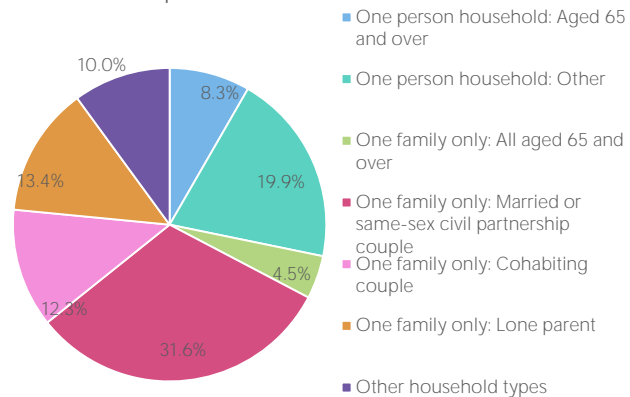

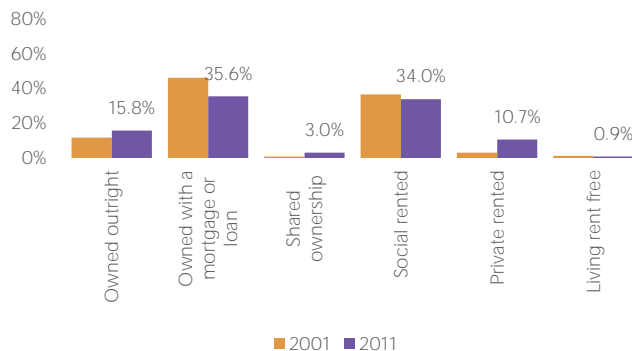
Over the decade, average household size declined from 2.58 to 2.50. Average household size was above the borough (2.40) and region (2.38) average. The average home in Popley had 5.1 rooms and 2.7 bedrooms, below the borough average (5.8 and 2.9).

Household Composition



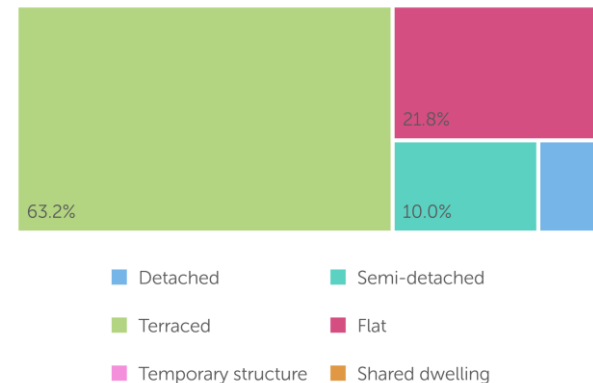
There were 4,010 households in Popley and these housed 10,015 people. Many households were occupied by married or same-sex civil partnership couple households (31.6%). Over a quarter (28.2%) of households were lived in by those that live alone, an increase of 14.7% since 2001. 12.8% of households were occupied entirely by those aged 65 and over.

Household Tenure



Over the decade, the percentage of households that owned their home with a mortgage declined by 23.2%. Outright ownership increased by 34.9%, whilst private renting grew by 243.6%. Shared ownership increased by 279.6%, which was an increase of 95 households.

Accommodation Type



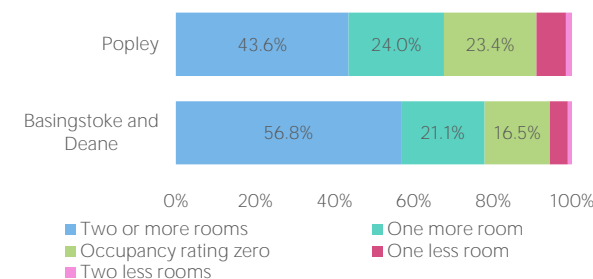
The majority of households lived in terraced properties (63.2%). The percentage living in flats increased by 22.0% over the decade. The percentage living in houses and bungalows declined by 4.7%.

Car Availability

24.9% of households had no access to a car or van, compared to 15.2% for Basingstoke and Deane as a whole. 1.2% had access to four or more cars or vans. There were 4,450 cars or vans.



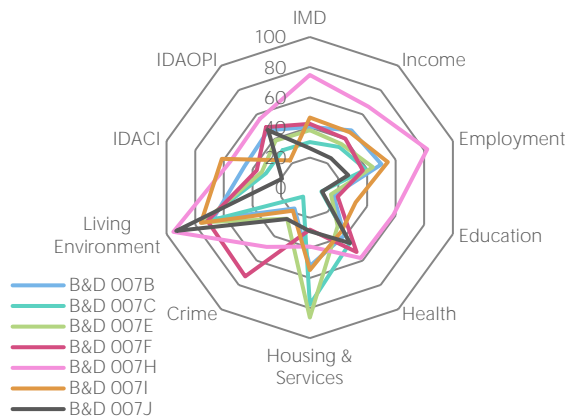
Occupancy Rating



Many households had two or more rooms than they needed (43.6%).



Indices of Deprivation, 2019



The chart shows Indices of Deprivation data for each domain and both IDACI and IDAOPI. It records how deprived each Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) in the ward was compared with all LSOAs in England. The closer each LSOA is to 32,844 (shown as 100), the lower the deprivation. B&D 007J was more disadvantaged than the other LSOAs in the ward (LSOA boundaries are shown on the ward map).

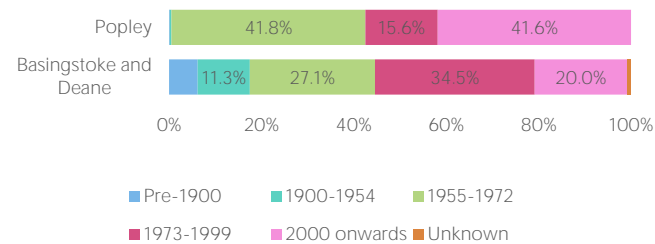

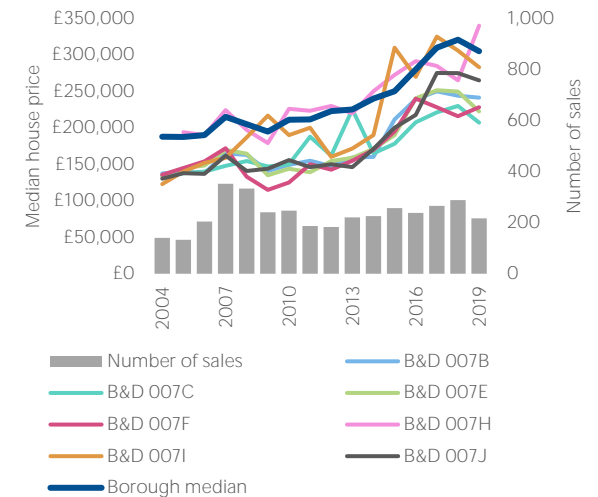


Council tax property build period, 2020



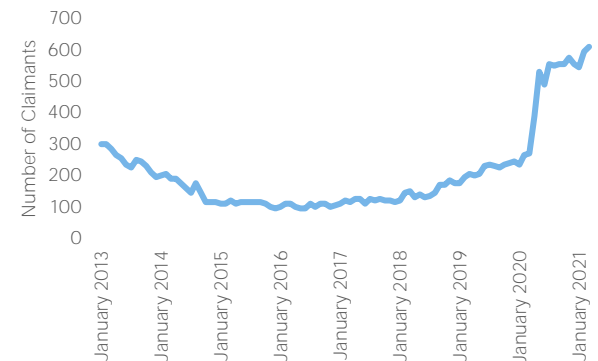
Popley had a larger percentage of dwellings built in the 21st Century compared to Basingstoke and Deane as a whole, with 64.6% built from 2000 onwards, compared to 20.0% for the borough overall.

House prices and sales, 2004-2019



There were 215 home sales in 2019, the lowest figure since 2012. This was 7.3% of the borough's house sales. One LSOA within the ward (B&D 007H) had a median house price in 2019 of £340,000, compared to the borough median of £305,000, and prices in this LSOA are usually around the borough average.

The number of unemployed benefit claimants peaked in March 2021.



Ward Map

The ward boundary is shown in grey.

Due to ward boundary changes, some data is only available for the area covered by the output areas (OAs) and lower super output areas (LSOAs) that best fit the ward area. The best fit output area boundaries are shown surrounded by the blue dashed line. Popley contains seven LSOAs and their best fit boundaries are shown with coloured backgrounds on the map.

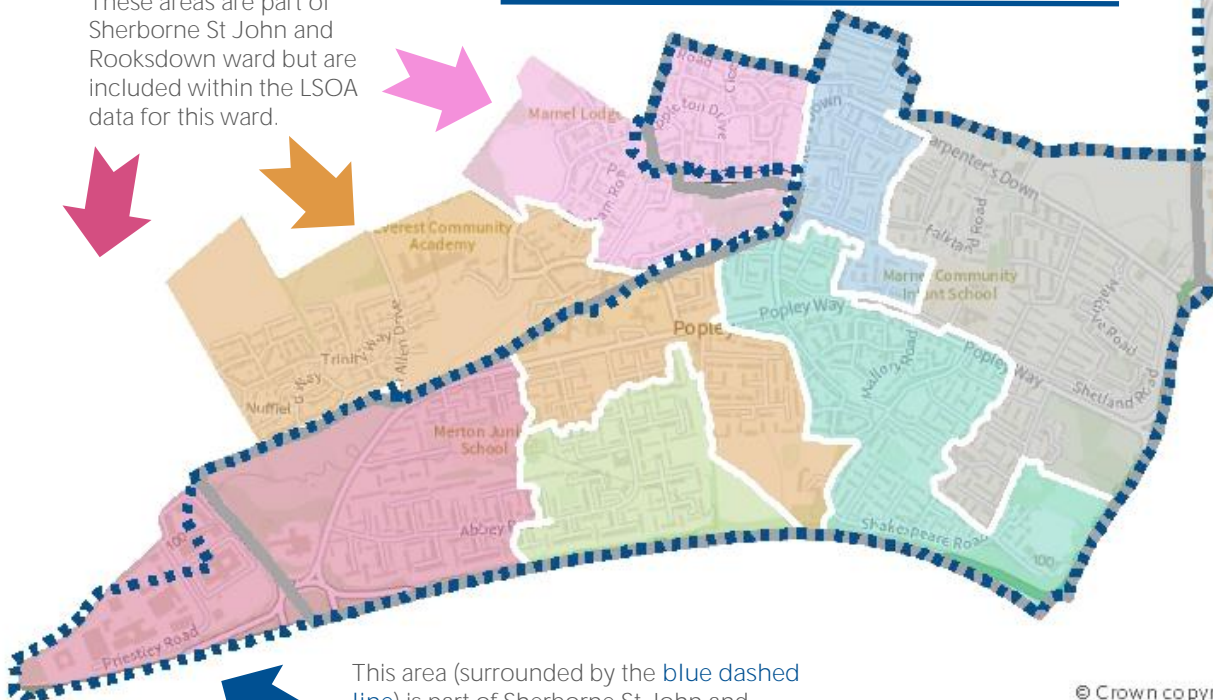
An OA and LSOA is allocated to a ward if its population weighted centroid falls within the ward. This means that Chineham Business Park (that actually falls within Chineham ward) and Priestley Road (Sherborne St John and Rooksdwn ward) are included within the ward's data. Part Appleton Drive and Englefield Way (covered with grey horizontal lines) are not included within the ward's OA data.
